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HOP AND HIS CRU

Coach Todd Hopkins has been a driving force at Marquette for 20 plus years. With the Crusaders' 10-1 victory over Peoria Christian last season, Hopkins gained his 500th win! That includes 12 seasons of at least 25 wins, the first of those in his second year at the helm of the Cru when he led them to fourth place at the IHSA 1A State Finals. This season's program consists of 24 wins and 8 losses. His winning percentage of .748 is believed to be the highest of any coach with at least 500 wins.

"To do anything like (500 wins) you have to have good players, good assistant coaches and a place that believes in you and lets you do your thing, and Marquette did that. It was a collaborative effort by everyone. ... It's nice, probably something that I'll think about 20 years from now," Hopkins said.

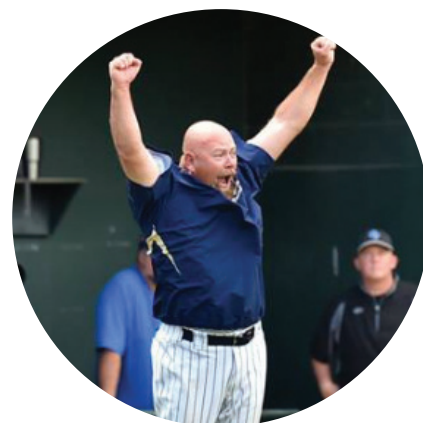

The 2018 30-2 season was impressive, but not expected. No one had the foresight to see what this team was capable of accomplishing. The Crusaders were a team that got along, had fun together and kept grinding until the very last play of every single inning.

After winning the Regional, Sectional and Super Sectional, the Cru advanced to State in search of the 1-A Championship title. After a 13-8 loss against Aurora Christian, Marquette played for 3rd place against Goreville. Goreville broke the 1-1 tie with a game-changing two runs in the bottom of the fifth. MA pulled within one in the sixth but went down in the seventh to bring home the fourth in State Hardware. A celebratory reception at Bader Gym awaited our heroes. Hop and his Cru made Marquette history, again.

No matter what terrible things happen in the world, no matter what confusion I experience in my life, ***"God is light, and in Him there is no darkness at all" (1 John 1:5).***

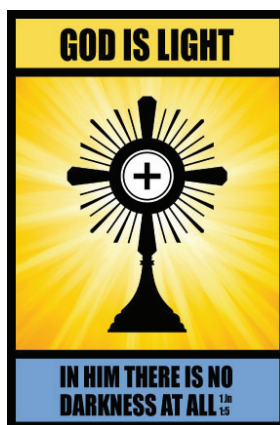
Following the school shooting in Parkland, Florida last February, students around the country responded by voicing their fear, and by pleading with the adults who run this country to do something to ensure their safety. This prompted a national discussion about how to stop the recurring theme of students expressing their rage by shooting up their school. Some called for more gun control, others suggested arming teachers, and many suggested more counselors, psychiatrists and armed guards on campus. While some of these things might be helpful, none of them addresses the root of the problem: why all the rage?

One member of the Florida State House of Representatives had a different response. Rep. Kimberly Daniels said, "We cannot put God in a closet when the issues we face are bigger than us," and, "God is the light...our schools need light in them like never before." Unfortunately, it was the adults who run this country that outlawed in-school prayer in public schools in the 1960's. Without God in our schools and in our American public life, our young people are left without any moral guidance. They don't know who they are, they don't know right from wrong, and they don't know where to turn when life's problems are bigger than them...and it's not their fault. Because of the sense of meaninglessness and confusion this causes, it's no wonder young people have so much rage.

Rep. Daniels made some concrete progress in helping to right this problem. She helped pass a bill that took effect this past July requiring all state schools in Florida to prominently display their state motto: "In God We Trust." Although God has not been kicked out of our Catholic school, we are always affected by the ethos of the time. I want this same message of hope to speak at Marquette loud and clear, so this school year will have a theme: "God is Light (in Him there is no darkness at all)". It will be proclaimed from banners, posters, and holy cards alike. For when we know the Light of God, our lives are never meaningless, our problems are never too big, and when making difficult decisions, we always have a Light to guide us.

May this school year be filled with the pure Light of God,

OUTSTANDING ALUMNI

Jennifer L. (Anderson) Czech, a 1979 graduate of Marquette (High) Academy, is our Spotlight Alumni. Jennifer's parents are Dolores and the late Donald Anderson. Her siblings include Scott, Greg, Susan and J.P., all Marquette (High) Academy graduates.

Jennifer, a resident of New Canaan, CT and Newport Beach, CA, is married to Stephen J. Czech, Chief Investment Officer of Czech Asset Management, LP. Jennifer and Steve are the parents of daughter Sydney, a recent graduate of Villanova University. The Czech family is a very generous supporter of Marquette Academy for which we are extremely grateful.

Jennifer and Steve's only son, Mikey, passed away from a rare pediatric brain tumor known as Diffuse Intrinsic Pontine Glioma (DIPG) in 2008 at the age of 11. DIPG is a brain-stem tumor that affects the cranial nerves of children ages 3-16 years of age. This cancer destroys the nerves that supply the muscles to the eye and face and muscles involving breathing. Notwithstanding this physical deterioration, the children maintain their mental faculties and are fully cognizant of what is happening to them. Survival past 12 to 14 months is uncommon. Due to these facts, new treatment methods are urgently needed as no known effective therapies currently exist.

Jennifer and Steve have since established The Mikey Czech Foundation, a 501 (c)(3) non-profit foundation to finance medical research for pediatric brain tumors, including DIPG. Jennifer



and Steve have recently announced a \$1.0 million gift to the Dana-Farber Cancer Institute/Harvard Medical School in Boston, MA. This is the largest-ever, single-donor gift dedicated to DIPG research. Thanks to their tireless efforts, Jennifer and Steve continue to raise money to advance the research required to develop remedies for this rare pediatric cancer.
